



Transforming Communities Through Enhancing Maternal And Child Health:

A Spotlight On Rtn Alice Zalwango's Efforts To Improve Maternal And Child Health

Down a dusty road, surrounded by the economically powerful small towns of Kyengera, Mutundwe, Bunamwaya and Seguku, lies the humble community of Nalumunye that houses over 2000 households. A community with mixed categories of people, the elite class and the vulnerable class. We have schools, prayer places, markets, and many other social amenities.

n one end is a group of citizens that can afford the bare minimum of life; safe water, decent healthcare, first class education, electricity and decent food among others. On the other end, a section of the community is unable to easily access these needs.

The challenge was that the health units were very far for people who had to use boda bodas to travel, especially the elderly, the expectant mothers and children. The situation would be worse at night and in the rainy season. Accessing healthcare became very difficult and costly.



order to respond to this challenge, one of our Rotarians, a retired midwife, Rtn Zalwango Alice popularly known as "Mumbejja", set out to make a difference in the Nalumunye community. "Before

I opened up this clinic, there was great need. Mothers used to knock at my door in the middle of the night for help, the expectant mothers and those whose children were sick and developed severe symptoms at night came to my home for help. Even the elderly people in the community had challenges accessing treatment

The situation got worse at night as you could hardly get a means of transport to go to the nearest health facility in Kitebi or Kasenge. The story got worse during the rainy season, as the roads became very slippery and sometimes impassable. With my profession I knew I could make a difference

and save a life", narrates Mumbejja Alice.

In 2016, Mumbejja Alice opened up a small clinic to respond to the needs of the community. From then on, she has not looked back. She has immunized hundreds of children since then. Mumbejja also conducts between 10-20 deliveries every month, some of whom have delivered on their way to the hospital.

"If only I was equipped with a fridge for storing medicines, I would be in position to offer weekly immunization sessions to children. Right now I do not have a fridge and so I cannot offer weekly immunization sessions," she said.

Mumbejja also desires to improve her maternal services by acquiring new equipment like a delivery bed baby coat, and others.

According to the Club President Rtn. Deborah K. Kakande, the club has set out to improve maternal and child health in the Nalumunye Community. "One of the interventions we're going to employ is to support health facilities around the Nalumunye community, like Mumbejja's clinic, Kasenge Health Centre-II. Through this, we will be able to improve the services we provide to expectant mothers and children in the community." Rtn Deborah said.

President Deborah appeals to all stakeholders; corporate companies, government entities, NGOs, individuals and the community to come on board and partner with the club for improved service delivery to our people.

Rotary's call to improve MCH

Rotary calls on individuals, companies and organisations to support initiatives that make health care available to mothers

and children so they can live longer, grow stronger and have a brighter future.

Rotary makes high-quality health care available to vulnerable mothers and children so they can live longer and grow stronger.

We expand access to quality care, so mothers and children everywhere can have the same opportunities for a healthy future. An estimated 5.9 million children under the age of five die each year because of malnutrition, inadequate health care, and poor

sanitation- all of which can be prevented.


Rotary makes amazing things happen, like:

The Value Of Partnerships In **Community Development:**

A case of partnerships for improved development in Nalumunye

Times change

We no longer live in the "command and control" era, nor are our actions governed by feudal law. Good riddance, great news.

Today, when it comes to decision-making quality critical planning and economic development issues, we live in the age of partnerships.

Partnerships represent the pinnacle of leadership and collaboration in civil society. More than just a "purchase order", true partnerships are the most difficult, rewarding, and effective form of decision-making available to us.

The issues facing communities today are many and complex, and exist at a wide range of scales. But partnerships are increasingly becoming the answer for issues that involve many stakeholders or require the application of many minds to address.

Community partnerships be as diverse and varied as the communities in which they're located and the issues they're formed to tackle. Some may be ad hoc committees, formed to quickly respond to a discrete community issue and can then be disbanded as quickly as they form. Others form to take on larger projects, developing structures by which they operate and creating comprehensive strategies advance their goals. But in a nutshell, a community partnership is a collaborative relationship between willing entities formed to address shared objectives.

Of the many reasons to form community partnerships. few stand out. The first can be summed up by the African proverb: "If you want to go fast, go alone. If you want to go far, go together." Effective partnerships leverage the strengths of each partner and apply it strategically to the issue at hand. It might take more work, and it might take longer, but strong partnerships build the relationships, shared understanding, and collective focus to make lasting progress.

Second, there is value in working with a variety of organizations, for a couple of reasons. One, because they function best when all participants actively engage, community partnerships push entities to see and understand issues from different perspectives. We learn much when actively listening, even when-especially when-opinions and challenge those of our own. Beyond that, there may be new opportunities to network, build business, or learn about new tools that others offer.

Effective community partnerships rarely emerge overnight. They are the product of time and thoughtful deliberation. Those two factors bookend a series of other key elements that create effective partnerships. Among them:

Leadership: My colleague wrote that "leadership is to communities as chocolate chips are to cookies: the more the better." If that's the case, then partnerships are the butter holding the chips in place.

Aligned Vision: Each partner must be pursuing the same essential goal. This does not mean they are committed to the same outcomes, approach, values systems and the like- in fact, disagreement about these can be healthy for the group. But it must be moving in the same general direction. One partnership consisting of one group seeking to create a community sculpture park and another hoping to win a grant for a water cistern is unlikely to work, for example.

Communication: Strong and consistent feedback loops grease the skids of understanding and progress. It's also one of the easiest things to achieve, especially today with the proliferation of smart phones and social media.

The opportunities for partnership between the Rotary Club of Nalumunye and partners within and outside the community is enormous. With a clear vision, the club hopes to ride on these opportunities in order to improve the well-being and development of the community.


