



PROJECT HIGHLIGHTS

Tripartite: Uniting for Better Security in our Community

[It isn't enough to talk about peace. One must believe in it. And it isn't enough to believe in it. One must work at it." - Eleanor Rooseveltl

On July 26, 2025, the Rotary Clubs of Nalumunye, Mutundwe, Rubaga Lake View, and the Rotaract Club of Mutundwe launched a joint project, TRIPARTITE, at Bunamwaya Community Police Station. The project falls under Rotary International's Focus Area of "Peace Building and Conflict Resolution."

A needs assessment revealed that the living and working conditions of security personnel at the station required improvement. The police station's structures were in disrepair, with leaking roofs and damaged doors. Inmates also lacked adequate bedding.

President Deborah K. Kakande of Rotary Club of Nalumunye emphasized the importance of supporting the government to enhance security personnel's living conditions, enabling them to provide better services

to the community.

The four Rotary Clubs have outlined a comprehensive plan to renovate the police station, including fixing ceilings, installing new doors, and painting among other repairs, revealed President Stella Muhumuza of RC Mutundwe.

On the other hand, President Ivan Mulumba of Rubaga Lake View thanked Rotarians for their contributions and sacrifice, highlighting the significance of

joint partnerships in creating community impact.

Rotaracters were not left out in this joint project. The Rotaract President, Nassamba Maria Praise on the other hand pledged to lead her team to support this project to completion. "It's humbling to be part of this nobel cause. We're happy to be part of this and I know that by the end of the project, we will have created impact; Together, One Act At A Time!" She said.

The event was graced Assistant Governor Robert Nsereko expressed excitement about the project, emphasizing alignment with Rotary's areas of focus and thanking Rotarians for their participation and generosity. "Thank you for heeding to the Governors' call to work in tripartite. It's one of the ways you can to deliver impactful projects," AG Bob said, before encouraging Rotarians to keep working together. He appreciated the police for the partnership and choosing to partner with Rotary.

In a show of confidence, the O/C Station Nvano Raymond welcomed the project, noting that improved working conditions would energize his staff to serve better. He welcomed the initiative and pledged his support and commitment.

According to one of the Project Directors Rtn Ssuna from RC Mutundwe, the project is expected to be completed within a month. He called on Rotarians to actively participate to enable the timely completion of the project.

Peacebuilding and conflict resolution is a core focus area for Rotary International. Rotary promotes peace by addressing the root causes of conflict, such as poverty, discrimination, and inequality, and by supporting development education and initiatives that foster under standing and cooperation. One of the ways to achieve this is through local and global service projects among others

Maternal and Child Health in Africa: A Spotlight on Uganda and Rotary's **Impact**

aternal and child health remains one of the most pressing public health challenges across Africa. Despite significant progress over the past two decades, millions of women and children still face preventable health risks due to limited access to quality care, poor infrastructure, and socio-economic barriers. In Uganda, the situation reflects both the continent's struggles and its resilience. As Rotary International continues to champion maternal and child health globally, clubs like Rotary Club of Nalumunye are stepping up in 2025/2026 to make a tangible difference.

Africa accounts for 69% of global maternal deaths, with sub-Saharan Africa bearing the highest burden. According to the World Health Organization, the maternal mortality ratio (MMR) in the region stands at

approximately 545 deaths per 100,000 live births, compared to 12 per 100,000 in developed countries. The under-five mortality rate is also alarming, with 5.6 million children dying annually from preventable causes such as malnutrition, infections, and poor sanitation. The Major reason that contribute to this state of affairs is limited access to skilled birth attendants. inadequate antenatal and postnatal care. High rates

outcomes. According to the 2022 Uganda Demographic and Health Survey (UDHS):

Maternal mortality ratio dropped from 336 (2016) to 189 deaths per 100,000 live births



As Rotary International continues to champion maternal and child health globally, clubs like Rotary Club of Nalumunye are stepping up in 2025/2026 to make a tangible difference.

- Infant mortality rate stands 0 at 36 deaths per 1,000 live births
- 0 Under-five mortality rate is 52 deaths per 1,000 live births
- Neonatal mortality rate is 22 0 deaths per 1,000 live births

Despite these improvements, challenges persist:

- Teenage childbearing remains high, with 1 in 4 adolescents having begun childbearing
- Only 66% of mothers receive postnatal care within 2 days
- Stunting affects 24.4% of children under five, indicating chronic malnutrition

Rotary International has long prioritized maternal and child health as one of its seven areas of focus. Through its global network, Rotary:

- Distributes clean birth kits and trains health workers in safe delivery practices
- Supports mobile prenatal clinics in remote areas, such as Haiti and Nigeria
- 0 Funds neonatal equipment for hospitals through global grants
- Promotes immunization campaigns, breastfeeding education, and HIV prevention

In Africa, Rotary clubs have launched initiatives to:

- Renovate maternity wards 0
- 0 Train midwives and traditional birth attendants
- Provide cancer screening for 0 women
- Support obstetric fistula repairs and postnatal care

In alignment with Rotary District 9214's theme of "Women and Children First", the Rotary Club of Nalumunye has declared maternal and child health as its flagship focus for the 2025/2026 Action Year

Planned Initiatives Include:

- Distribution of mama kits and mosquito nets to expectant mothers in underserved communities
- 0 Community health talks on prenatal care, nutrition, and hygiene
- Support for local health 0 centers with essential supplies and equipment
- Engagement with schools and churches to promote adolescent reproductive health education

This commitment is part of a broader district-wide strategy to reduce maternal mortality, improve immunization coverage, and empower women through and education leadership development. To sustain progress in maternal and child health, Uganda and Africa must:

- Strengthen health systems 0 and infrastructure
- Expand access to skilled 0 birth attendants and emergency obstetric care
- Promote adolescent health education and family planning
- Foster public-private partnerships, including with organizations like Rotary

Maternal and child health is not just a health issue- it's a matter of dignity, equity, and future prosperity. As Uganda continues its journey toward healthier families, the Rotary Club of Nalumunye stands as a beacon of hope and action. Through its 2025/2026 initiatives, it is not only saving lives but also inspiring a culture of care, compassion, and community transformation.


ince July 2025, our club has taken deliberate steps strengthen Rotary experience for both prospective and current members through a range of meaningful engagement initiatives.











