And ease my soul

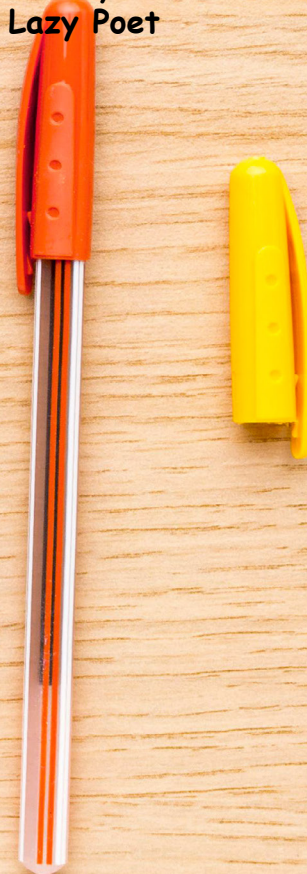
If am opting for a second profession

But with love, till the end of time.

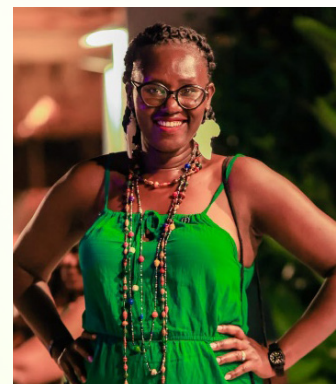
Poetry is an art

## Reaching Every Child: Rotary Club Of Nalumunye's Fight Against Polio Through Community Immunization

In a powerful show of community service and compassion, the Rotary Club of Nalumunye recently organized an Immunization and Health Awareness Programme aimed at protecting children from the dangers of Polio and other preventable diseases. The outreach, held in partnership with the Government of Uganda and a local health facility, not only brought vital healthcare closer to the community but also reignited hope among families with limited access to health centers.

The initiative was designed to raise awareness about the importance of immunization and ensure that no child is left behind due to distance or lack of information. Through this effort, 108 children

were successfully immunized against Polio, while an additional 37 received vaccinations against other preventable diseases, including deworming services.

The program's impact extended even further as pregnant mothers also turned up for antenatal immunization services, highlighting how community-driven initiatives can address multiple health needs in one setting.

### Fathers Step Forward for Child Health

One of the most inspiring moments of the day was the active participation of fathers—a rare and commendable sight in community health outreach programs. Several

fathers personally brought their children for immunization, a reflection of growing awareness and a positive shift toward shared responsibility for family health. Their involvement symbolized a deeper cultural change, proving that protecting children's health is a collective effort that requires both parents' participation.

### Reaching the Unreachable

During the exercise, health workers encountered children as old as four months who had never been immunized. Many of these cases were linked to long distances to health facilities and limited knowledge about the benefits of immunization. These stories reinforced the urgency of taking healthcare services directly to the

community, where they are most needed.

In total, the event attracted 188 participants, including caretakers, local leaders, Rotarians, and Rotaractors, with 145 children benefiting directly from the immunization services provided. The turnout reflected both community trust and Rotary's growing role in advancing public health and awareness.

### **A Step Forward in the Fight Against Polio**

This outreach not only strengthened the fight against Polio but also deepened community engagement in promoting health education. By bringing services closer to families and sparking conversations about the value of immunization, the Rotary Club of Nalumunye continues to uphold Rotary's global commitment to End Polio Now and to build healthier, more resilient communities.

The success of this initiative is a testament to what can be achieved when communities, government, and Rotary come together — proving once again that every vaccine given is a step closer to a polio-free world.

According to Action President Deborah K. Kakande of the Rotary Club of Nalumunye — who also serves as President of Presidents for the Rotary Action Year — even though polio cases are no longer commonly heard of, the fight is far from over. She emphasized the importance of continued immunization to ensure that no loophole allows the virus to



reverse the tremendous progress achieved over the years.

Rtn. Zalwango, a dedicated health practitioner who runs a local clinic in Nalumunye, echoed this call. She urged parents to remain vigilant and adhere to their children's immunization schedules, reminding them that these life-saving vaccines are offered free of charge, and so there is no reason why children should miss their scheduled doses.

Community leader Harriet Kabaliisa expressed heartfelt gratitude to the Rotary Club of Nalumunye for bringing essential health services closer to the people. Her appreciation was shared by several mothers who noted that, in the past, they often had to travel long distances to access such services from Health Centres surrounding Nalumunye — a challenge now eased through Rotary's outreach efforts.



# My Rotary Journey As A Polio Officer: A Year of Impact, Challenge, and Purpose

When I joined Rotary, I was eager to serve — but I never imagined that my very first role, as a Polio Officer in this Action Year, would touch my heart so deeply. I am still new in Rotary — not even a year old — yet the experiences I've had have been nothing short of transformative.

At first, the title “**Polio Officer**” sounded daunting. I knew about Rotary's global fight against polio, but I hadn't grasped the scale, the coordination, and the human connections that lie behind every single vaccinated child. That changed the day I stood in the field, watching tiny arms stretch out for their drops of protection.

Seeing children get immunized — knowing that in that small moment, their lives were being safeguarded

from a crippling disease — was profoundly moving. It wasn't just about vaccines; it was about hope, future, and humanity.

But the journey wasn't without its challenges. Mobilizing communities to come for free immunization services was harder than I expected. Convincing parents, organizing logistics, ensuring vaccines arrived on time — it demanded patience, persistence, and teamwork. Some days were exhausting, but every smiling child made it all worthwhile.

Through it all, I learned that building trust is everything. Working closely with the Village Health Teams (VHTs), local leaders, and officials like the District Health Officer of Wakiso and the Wakiso Hospital team taught me that real impact happens when communities feel seen and heard. Rotary didn't just show up with vaccines from Ministry of Health — we showed up with compassion.

## Lessons from the field

This experience has reshaped how I view community service. I've learned that:

**Community engagement** isn't optional — it's the heart of success. When people feel ownership, they show up.

**Collaboration** makes everything possible. Without our internal teamwork as Rotarians and our partnerships with government and health workers, none of this would have happened.

**Adaptability** is essential. In the field, plans change quickly — weather shifts, turnout varies, supplies delay — but the mission must go on.

**Commitment** is powerful. I now understand why Rotary International has stayed committed to ending polio for decades — and why Rotarians willingly contribute over \$100 each year toward this cause. It's a legacy of love and service that transcends time.

My deepest gratitude goes to my fellow Rotarians, the District Health Officer (Wakiso District), the Wakiso Hospital, the Village Health Teams, and all the local

leaders who made this mission possible. Together, we've shown that partnership truly is the backbone of progress.

### My Vision as a Polio Officer

When I dream of the future, I see:

**Communities completely free of polio**, with zero reported cases worldwide.

**Stronger healthcare systems**, especially in hard-to-reach areas.

**Every child** — regardless of background or location — **receiving their full immunization.**

**Empowered mothers and caregivers** making informed decisions about their children's health.

**Ongoing research and innovation** to sustain eradication and respond to new challenges.

Above all, I long to see children growing up healthy, happy, and free from preventable diseases — a future where no parent has to fear polio ever again.

# Strengthening Prospective Members Through Engagement And Learning

Membership is the heartbeat of Rotary - it fuels our service projects, sustains fellowship, and is a cornerstone of impact in our communities. This year, the Rotary Club (RC) of Nalumunye has embraced the **"Each One, Bring One"** initiative, encouraging every Rotarian to invite at least one new person - a colleague at work, a friend, a member of the community - to experience the spirit of Rotary and join our mission of "Service Above Self."

In October 2025, the club embarked on a four-week mentoring programme for the second cohort of prospective members to ensure that trainees begin their Rotary journey with knowledge and confidence. The club prepared a well-structured mentorship training program designed to prepare potential Rotarians before they are formally inducted.

## Preparing prospective members

An introductory session takes participants on a journey through Rotary's purpose, structure, and impact, highlighting Rotary's origins, mission, vision, values, and evolution into a global force for good. The session on the Global Structure and Hierarchy of Rotary helps participants appreciate how Rotary International, zones, districts, and local clubs work together toward shared goals. Also, at the club level, participants are guided through the Club's Structure and Leadership roles, understanding how each position or role contributes to effective service and fellowship. The session on benefits and obligations of being a Rotarian opens a window for participants to understand

## Understanding Rotary dues and financial commitments

A key part of Rotary membership is understanding the **financial obligations** that sustain both the club and Rotary's global work. To ensure transparency and accountability, participants are provided with a clear breakdown of Rotary dues to help prospective members understand how their contributions directly support Rotary's mission, from local projects to international humanitarian efforts. While exact amounts may vary by club, dues typically include:

**Rotary International Dues –** that support global operations, programs, and initiatives such as polio eradication, grants, and leadership training.

**District Dues and country dues –** which fund administration, training, and country and district-level initiatives.

**Club Dues that** cover local club operations, meeting logistics, communication, and community service activities.

**The Rotary Foundation –** voluntary contributions to **The Rotary Foundation** and local service funds, amplifying Rotary's impact worldwide.

A session on Rotary's areas of focus connects members to the broader vision, from promoting peace and fighting disease to protecting the environment.

The importance of The Rotary Foundation is also emphasized, illustrating how members' contributions help fund projects and transform lives globally.

Another key component of the training focuses on Service Projects - "heartbeat of Rotary." It is through these projects that Rotary's values come alive, translating goodwill into tangible community impact. The session on Rotary's Public Image and Branding reminds members that every Rotarian represents Rotary's values through their words, actions, and service.

## Building True Rotarians

Through this thoughtful training approach, the club is nurturing informed, engaged, and passionate Rotarians who understand what it means to serve above self. The **"Each One, Bring One"** initiative is more than an invitation; it is an opportunity to share the joy, purpose, and fellowship that define Rotary. As each of the club members reaches out to bring in new members, we strengthen the fabric of our club and ensure that Rotary's legacy of service continues to grow.

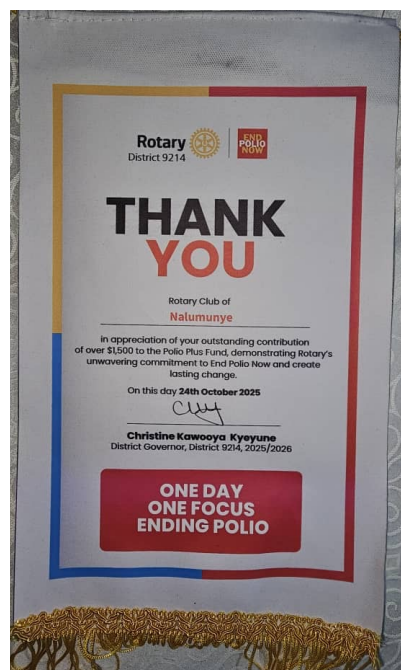

"We remain action oriented and focused on achieving our set targets and the ultimate Rotary goal," she said.

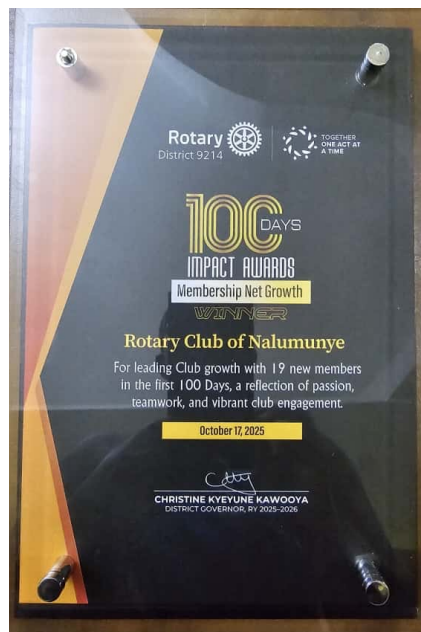

This focus area emphasizes building the capacity of entrepreneurs and community leaders, creating opportunities for productive work, reducing poverty in underserved communities, and supporting career-minded professionals through scholarships and mentorship. For RC Nalumunye, this theme is not just a seasonal highlight—it is a guiding principle that shapes every project and outreach effort.

From health facilities to places of worship and schools, RC Nalumunye has consistently demonstrated its commitment to uplifting communities. At St. Josaphat Church, the club recognized a pressing need for safe sanitation. Under the leadership of Action President Deborah Kakande, the church's washrooms were renovated and equipped with running water, restoring dignity and improving health for hundreds of congregants. In the same spirit, the club's planned water source projects will soon bring clean water to entire villages, reducing waterborne diseases and allowing

children—especially girls—to return to school. As Rtn. Frank Rutebarika aptly put it, "Clean water is not just a resource; it's a right. And when we deliver it, we deliver life."

At Kitebi Health Centre III, RC Nalumunye is constructing a triage facility to provide comfort and care to patients, particularly expectant mothers. This simple yet powerful initiative reflects the club's deep concern for maternal

health. Through the "Mama Kit" initiative, expectant mothers have received essential supplies for safe deliveries—items that are often taken for granted but have proven life-saving. Youth Services Director Rtn. Sherifa Kanya captured the spirit of this effort when she said, "When a mother feels supported, a generation is empowered." The club also contributed to malaria prevention by planting mosquito-

repellent plants around the health centre, addressing a disease that claims over 16,000 Ugandan lives annually. Looking ahead, RC Nalumunye plans to purchase a delivery bed for the health centre, further enhancing its capacity to serve the community.

Education has always been at the heart of RC Nalumunye's development strategy. Through scholarships, school supplies, and mentorship programs, the club has empowered learners to dream beyond their villages. One of its most ambitious projects is the ongoing construction of a classroom block at Bandwe Church of Uganda Primary School. Once completed, this facility will offer a safer and more dignified learning environment for children who previously studied in overcrowded or makeshift classrooms. Rtn. Philemon Mukisa captured the essence of this initiative, saying, "A classroom is more than walls—it's a launchpad for dreams." The club's partnership with the Rotaract Club

of Nalumunye continues to inspire youth to pursue meaningful careers and grow as leaders, echoing Rotary's commitment to sustainable development.

In its efforts to strengthen economic resilience, RC Nalumunye organized a financial literacy program that drew hundreds of participants—from small-scale traders to large business owners and first-time entrepreneurs. Held in partnership with FINCA Uganda, the event emphasized the importance of financial literacy not only for business success but also for managing household income and expenditures. Action President Deborah Kakande underscored this message, noting that financial literacy is a foundational skill for both personal and community prosperity.

Across District 9214, Rotary clubs are transforming economies one village at a time. In Yumbe, Village Savings and Loan Associations have empowered

local entrepreneurs—especially women—to start businesses, save money, and invest in their futures. RC Nalumunye plans to adopt similar models by supporting a village, ensuring that economic development is rooted in empowerment rather than dependency. Rotary International reminds us that nearly 1.4 billion employed people live on less than \$1.25 a day. Through vocational training, microfinance, and entrepreneurship support, Rotary clubs worldwide are lifting communities out of poverty. RC Nalumunye proudly aligns with this mission, proving that even small acts—like building a triage or donating a mama kit—can ripple into profound change.

As we continue this journey, RC Nalumunye invites every Rotarian to reflect deeply: What more can we do? How can we deepen our impact? Let us dream boldly, act compassionately, and build communities where every person has the opportunity to flourish.

"When a child can drink clean water, read with confidence, and learn in a safe place, their whole future bends toward possibility." Namengo UPLIFT is not a one-day project — it's a movement of dignity, education, and empowerment.

As the curtain closes on October, we look back with gratitude and forward with renewed purpose. ***"True greatness is found in humble service, collective effort, and unwavering love for humanity."*** With every act of service, we write another line in the story of Rotary's mission. 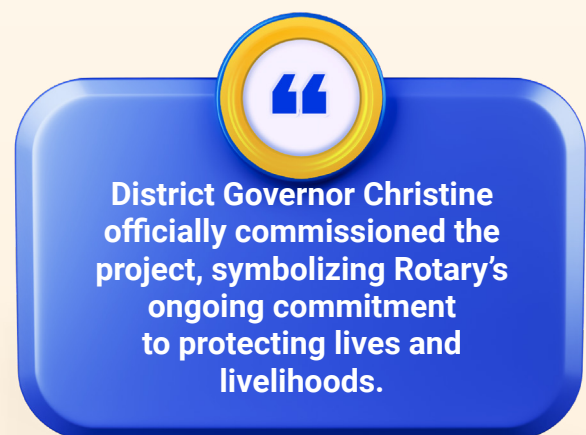
