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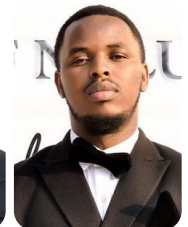

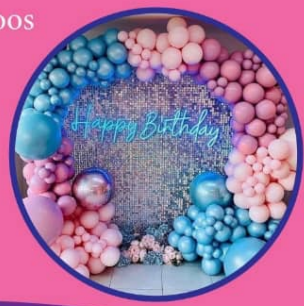

We began with a gesture that spoke volumes at Bunamwaya Police Post, where together with the Rotary Club of Mutundwe and the Rotaract Club of Mutundwe, we restored dignity to the men and women who safeguard our communities. What was once a struggling space now carries a sense of order and hope, and in their eyes we saw gratitude that could not be hidden. It was a reminder that when we strengthen those who protect us, we strengthen our community as a whole. ***“When we strengthen those who protect us, we strengthen our community as a whole.”***

Soon after, the spirit of service led us to Mutundwe Young Christian Secondary School, where more than 200 young girls received reusable sanitary kits and menstrual health education through the **Keep Her in School** initiative. This was not just our effort, but the work of an entire Rotary family — our Interactors

giving energy, our Rotaractors lending their passion, and all of us standing together to ensure that no girl's future is lost to the silence of stigma. The joy on their faces was unforgettable, and their whispered confidence that they can now remain in school was the true measure of success. ***“An educated girl today is a liberated woman tomorrow.”***

The month carried us to a day of immense meaning, when we were honored by the official visit of our District Governor, DG Christine Kyeyune Kawooya.

Her presence lifted our spirits and her words reminded us that Nalumunye's journey is woven into the larger mission of Rotary. That same day, the **Raising Parents Project** was launched, reminding us that the family remains the foundation of society. When parents are guided, children flourish, and communities stand stronger. It was a day not just of celebration but of recommitment to building the kind of homes from which better leaders, and better citizens, will rise. ***“Rotary is at its best when we think beyond projects and shape futures.”***

There was also a moment of deep pride when DG Christine Kyeyune Kawooya officially commissioned the Triage Centre at Kitebi Health Centre III. This facility, destined to serve more than 700 patients every month, now stands as a beacon of what can be achieved

when Rotarians, sister clubs, and communities work as one. Her words of encouragement rang true, but it was the quiet testimony of a health worker- "This centre will save lives every single day" - that will remain with me always. ***"Rotary is at its best when we think beyond projects and shape futures."*** ***"Health is not a privilege; it is the foundation of human dignity."***

At St. Josephat Catholic Church, Nalumunye, the renovation of the washrooms and installation of new hand-washing basins brought an important transformation to a place of worship that welcomes countless families each week. By improving sanitation and hygiene, the project not only created a cleaner environment but also reduced risks of disease and discomfort for the congregation. In strengthening such a vital community space, we affirmed

that faith and health must walk hand in hand, ensuring that worship is accompanied by dignity and care. ***"Where faith and hygiene meet, true wholeness begins."***

And as August drew to a close, our steps joined thousands of others in the Rotary Cancer Run. With 610 kits secured and a strong Nalumunye presence, we stood shoulder to shoulder with the wider Rotary family in the fight against cancer. Every stride was a declaration of hope, and each face in that sea of humanity was a reminder that together, we can conquer the hardest battles of our time. ***"Every stride we take together is a stride towards saving lives."***

My friends, none of these moments would have been possible without each of you. The Rotarians of Nalumunye have shown, time and again, that when dedication meets

compassion, change is inevitable. To every Rotarian who gave time, talent, or treasure, to every Interactor and Rotaractor who brought energy and spirit, and to every sister club that stood with us – I extend my heartfelt gratitude. Mentorship and Membership Growth: The club’s mentorship initiative, actively conducted throughout July and August, resulted in the District Governor inducting 13 new members, increasing the club’s capacity by 26 additional helping hands. This expansion not only grew membership but also fostered a greater sense of unity.

RC Nalumunye’s baby club- RC Nalumunye Heights in Formation secured a provisional status, revealing the commitment of the club to grow Rotary.

Strengthening Club Bonds: RC Nalumunye further solidified its sense of community by reaching out to members who were grieving

losses, visiting those who were ill, and organizing inclusive tea meetups and home hospitalities. These activities provided support and comfort, reinforcing the club’s commitment to caring for one another.

Buddy Groups and Service Projects: Buddy groups took the initiative in launching small-scale projects. Notably, at Kitebi Health Centre III in Wakiso District, the club started constructing a shade structure to protect pregnant mothers from the harsh sun, with plans also underway to install a water tank aimed at improving hygiene at the facility.

Engagement and Feedback: To further engage members, the club conducted a membership satisfaction survey and transparently shared the results,

highlighting a dedication to continuous improvement and open communication.

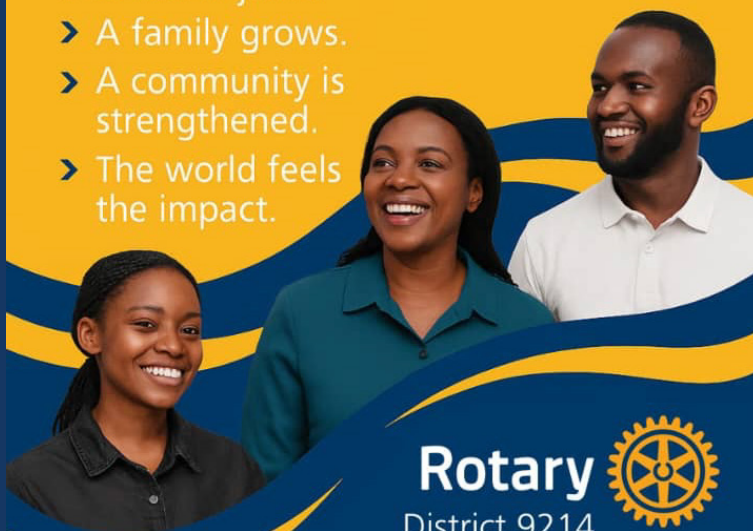

A Day of Impact and Inspiration: District Governor's Official Visit to President of Presidents' Club

On 27th August 2025, the Rotary Club of Nalumunye had the honor of hosting District Governor Christine Kyeyune Kawooya on her official club visit- a day that beautifully showcased service, impact, and creative fellowship.

The visit began at Kitebi Health Centre III, where DG Christine was welcomed by the Health Centre In-Charge Ms. Irene Kawooya Nakanyike and her team, as well as members of the Rotary Club of Nalumunye led by Action President Deborah K. Kakande.

Accompanied by District officials, DG Christine toured the club's Maternal & Child Health and Water, Sanitation and Hygiene projects. Central to these efforts is the ongoing construction of a triage and waiting shade, alongside a hand-wash facility, to provide mothers and children with a safer, healthier, and more dignified space. President Debbie explained that the current tent

fails to shield families, especially in harsh weather, coupled with the large patient numbers.

At the same Health Centre, DG Christine also met with expectant and new mothers, gifting them hygiene kits to support safe motherhood. Every month, the facility registers an average of 250 new mothers, many of whom come from vulnerable households. "Our delivery beds are dilapidated and need to be replaced," one of the Midwives revealed.

At the same facility, she also witnessed the club's malaria prevention initiative, planting mosquito-repellent plants- a project that will soon expand into schools across Nalumunye. The Health Centre In-Charge thanked the Rotary Club of Nalumunye for coming to support the Health Centre,

adding that they have so many other needs where they're seeking such kind of partnerships

The Governor's tour continued to St. Josaphat Catholic Church, where the club is renovating and upgrading the church public toilets. The Head of the Laity (Sabakristu) of the church, Mrs. Lydia Bitamazire praised the initiative, noting that the congregation had long lacked decent facilities and handwashing

stations. "This has come at the right time. Thank you so much Rotary Club of Nalumunye." she said.

The day was not only about projects but also about celebration and fellowship. Rotakids Chloe and LaVerne warmly welcomed

DG Christine with flowers and later recited a heartfelt poem urging Rotarians to keep spreading smiles around the world. Over 250 guests gathered for the colorful occasion, where President Debbie proudly presented the club's achievements. Guests delighted in an abundance of Munyes chicken,

before capping off the night with a vibrant silent disco.

DG Christine's visit was more than an inspection- it was a testament to the power of partnerships, the joy of service, and the unity of Rotary, leaving everyone inspired to do more for the community.

CLUB PROJECTS IN VIEW

Fighting the Age-old Disease of Humanity- Malaria through Natural Plant-based Solutions

Malaria, transmitted through the bite of a plasmodium-infected *Anopheles* mosquito, remains a significant global health concern.

Malaria is one of humanity's ancient diseases. Its historical records can be traced back as early as 2700 BC. By the 1800s, malaria had become a global scourge afflicting people across the world (Garcia, 2010). Despite scientific and medical advancements, malaria is still endemic in over 90 countries, and around 2 billion people are at risk of developing this infection annually, according to the latest data (2023). Malaria remains one of the leading causes of mortality, causing 1 million deaths worldwide annually. Unfortunately, Uganda is one of the countries severely affected by malaria.

Rotarians world over are restlessly providing both lifesaving services in their communities to reverse the fatal statistics claiming lives every hour. From distributing mosquito

nets to supporting early diagnosis, they are Uniting for Good, taking One Act at a time. In August, Nalumunye, through its Maternal & Child Health, WASH, and Fight Malaria projects, embarked on a proactive initiative to combat malaria by planting mosquito-repellent plants around the premises of Kitebi Health Centre III. With pregnant women, newborns, and other vulnerable populations at risk, the project aims to reduce the transmission of malaria by naturally repelling mosquitoes, creating a safer environment for all. This initiative aligns with Rotary's areas of focus on disease prevention and treatment, as well as maternal and child health, reinforcing our commitment to fostering

healthier and more sustainable communities.

Following reports of a high prevalence of malaria cases among patients seeking treatment at Kitebi Health Centre III, over six varieties of mosquito-repellent plants were strategically planted around the health centre's premises. This action is part of a

broader effort to reduce malaria transmission in the area and enhance the overall health and well-being of the community.

In Nalumunye community, a needs assessment was conducted on August 7th and 8th, highlighting strategies for effective malaria prevention. The assessment revealed a concerning prevalence of malaria in local schools, with one school warden reporting 20 cases among students. Additionally, private clinics record 2 to 4 new cases of malaria each week. The most affected groups are children under 5 years, followed by pregnant mothers, underscoring the urgent need for targeted interventions to protect these vulnerable populations.

RC Nalumunye remains committed to providing necessary information and spreading awareness about the prevention of this complex, life-threatening disease until zero infections are reported.

MANY CANCERS, ONE RACE. Kudos, RC Nalumunye

It is a rewarding opportunity to have been selected as a cancer run officer for the Action Year! As the year begun, my first challenge was to set a higher target of 500 Cancer run kits for RC Nalumunye and getting ways of how to reach the target. I am glad that all Rotarians positively responded to the call and we sold out 637 Cancer run kits over and above our target, thereby emerging the thirteenth overall, on the leading board.

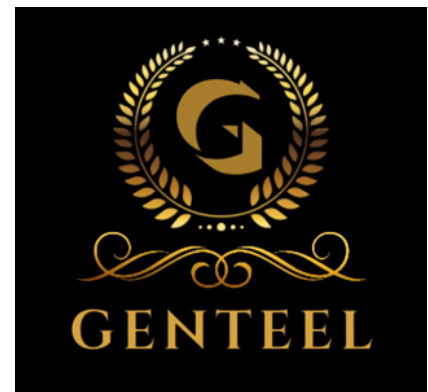

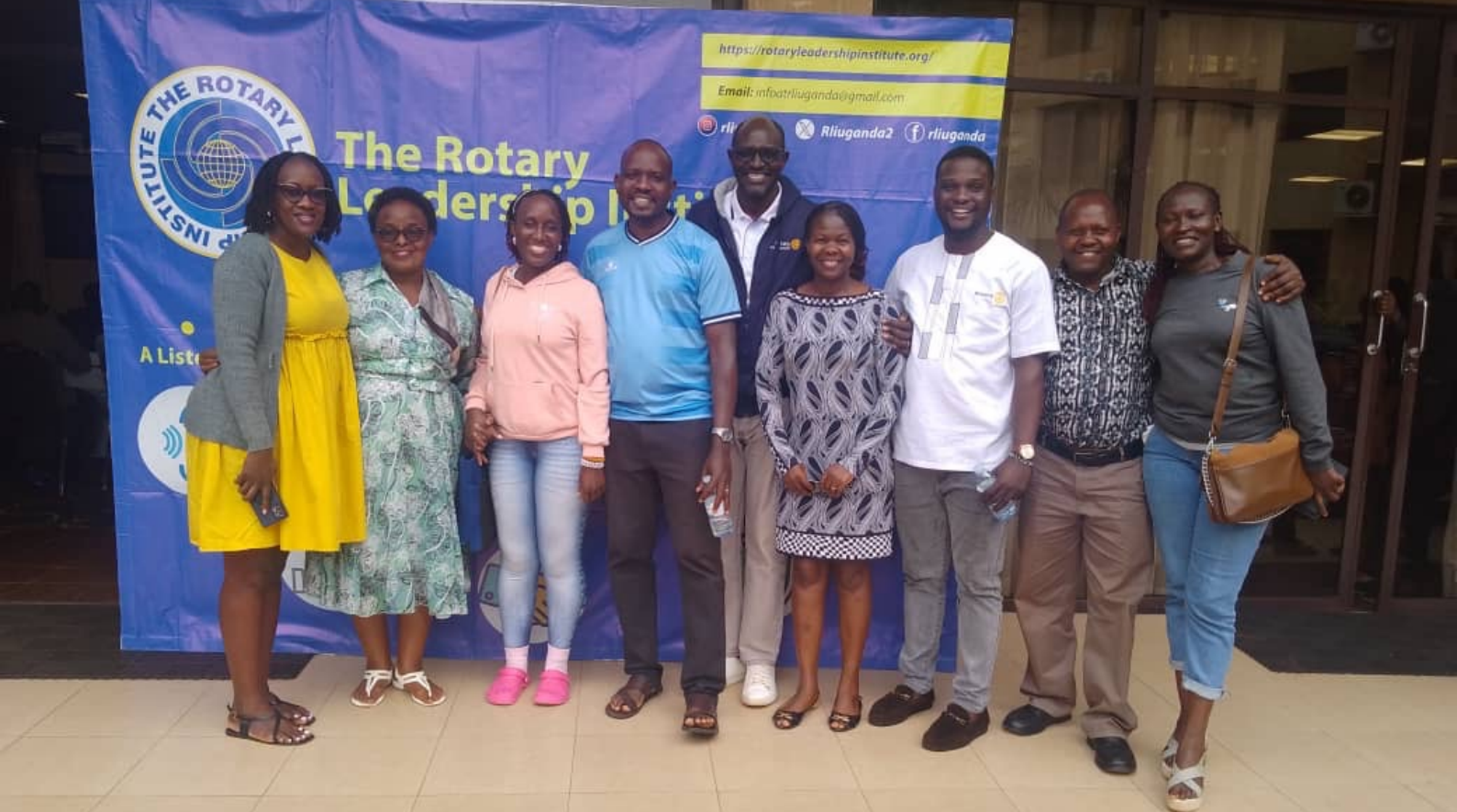
A central takeaway from RLI was the reminder of Rotary's mission and values. The training strengthened my appreciation for the organization's pillars of service, fellowship, and leadership development.

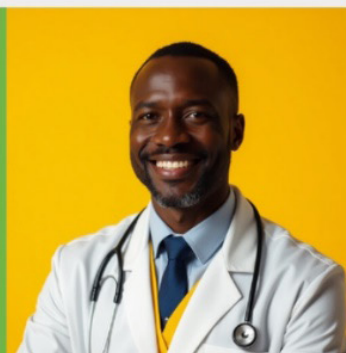

Keep Her In School Project Kicks Off

It's a year of action with the District Governor's ask to increase on our reach and grow numbers. The Rotary Club of Nalumunye together with the Rotaract Club of Nalumunye are increasing their reach and growing numbers through the formation of the Interact Club of Mutundwe Young Christian Secondary School Mutundwe.

Since formational activities started, the young people are so excited and for every meeting with them, the interest exhibited is very. As partners, we had a meeting on 12th August 2025 with the members of the Interact Club Information and all the girls in the school with an aim to 'keep the girl child in school'.

The Action President of RC Nalumunye gave a talk to the girls, assuring them that during adolescence the girls' body goes through several changes including the start of menstruation. The

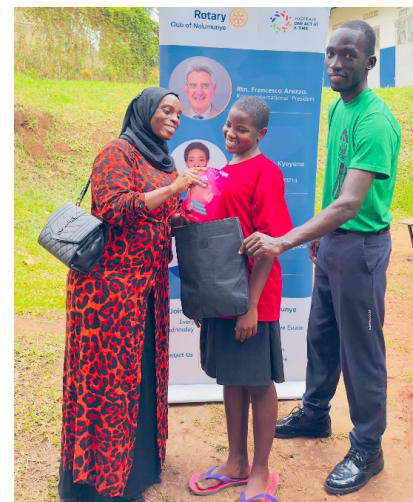
President emphasized that it is a period that requires the girl child to ensure good hygiene and need to have what to use during this particular time of the month. Girls need sanitary towels to use as well as observe hygiene by bathing at least twice a day and changing their sanitary towels frequently.

To support the girls in this aspect, the Rotarians and Rotaractors donated to the girls, sanitary kits to use during those times including reusable sanitary towels. The Rotarians and Rotaractors further trained the girls on how to use the kits and particularly how to maintain the hygiene with the reusable sanitary towels, while at school and also at home.

It was a great time where even fathers encouraged the girls to embrace the changes and be very confident to stand up for themselves. The girls were encouraged to embrace the new body changes and adapt

accordingly so they can keep in school as they are the future mothers and leaders of tomorrow.

We are convinced that this intervention will go a long way in encouraging the young adolescent girls to stay in school without worry of sanitary challenges. IF WE WANT TO CHANGE OUR FUTURE WE NEED TO START NOW.

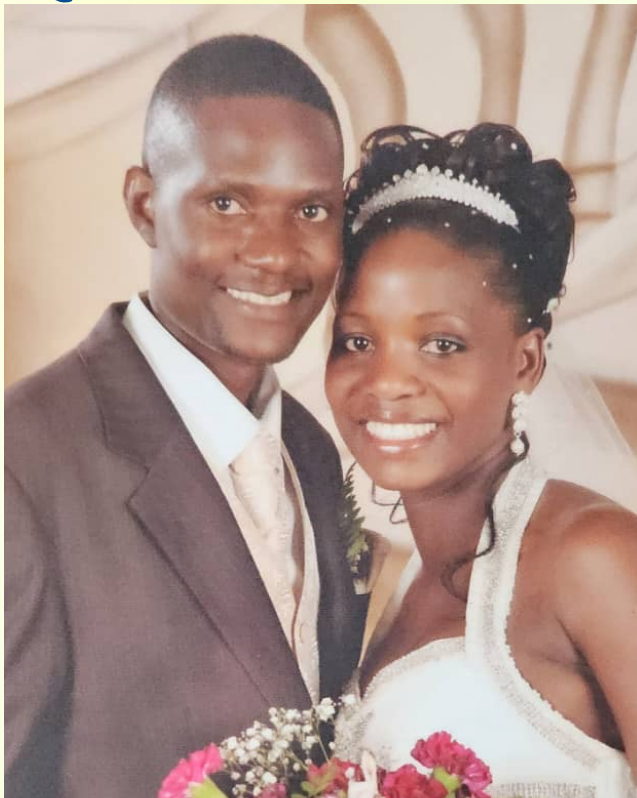

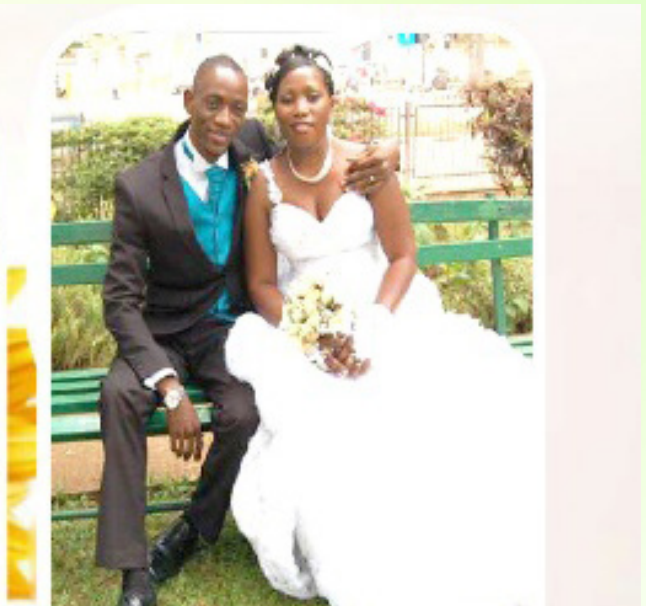

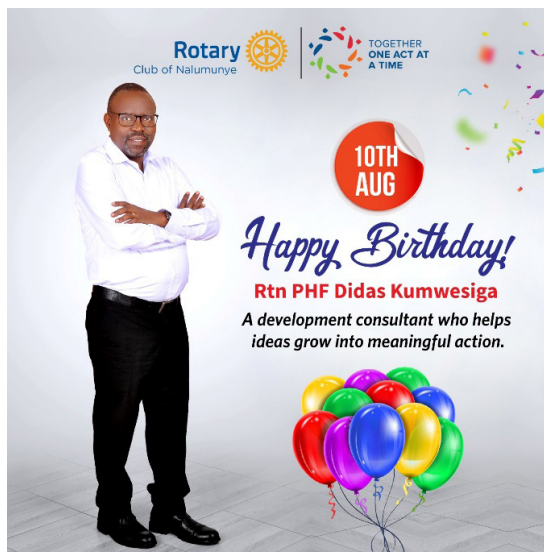
