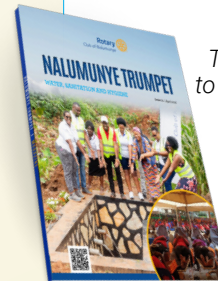

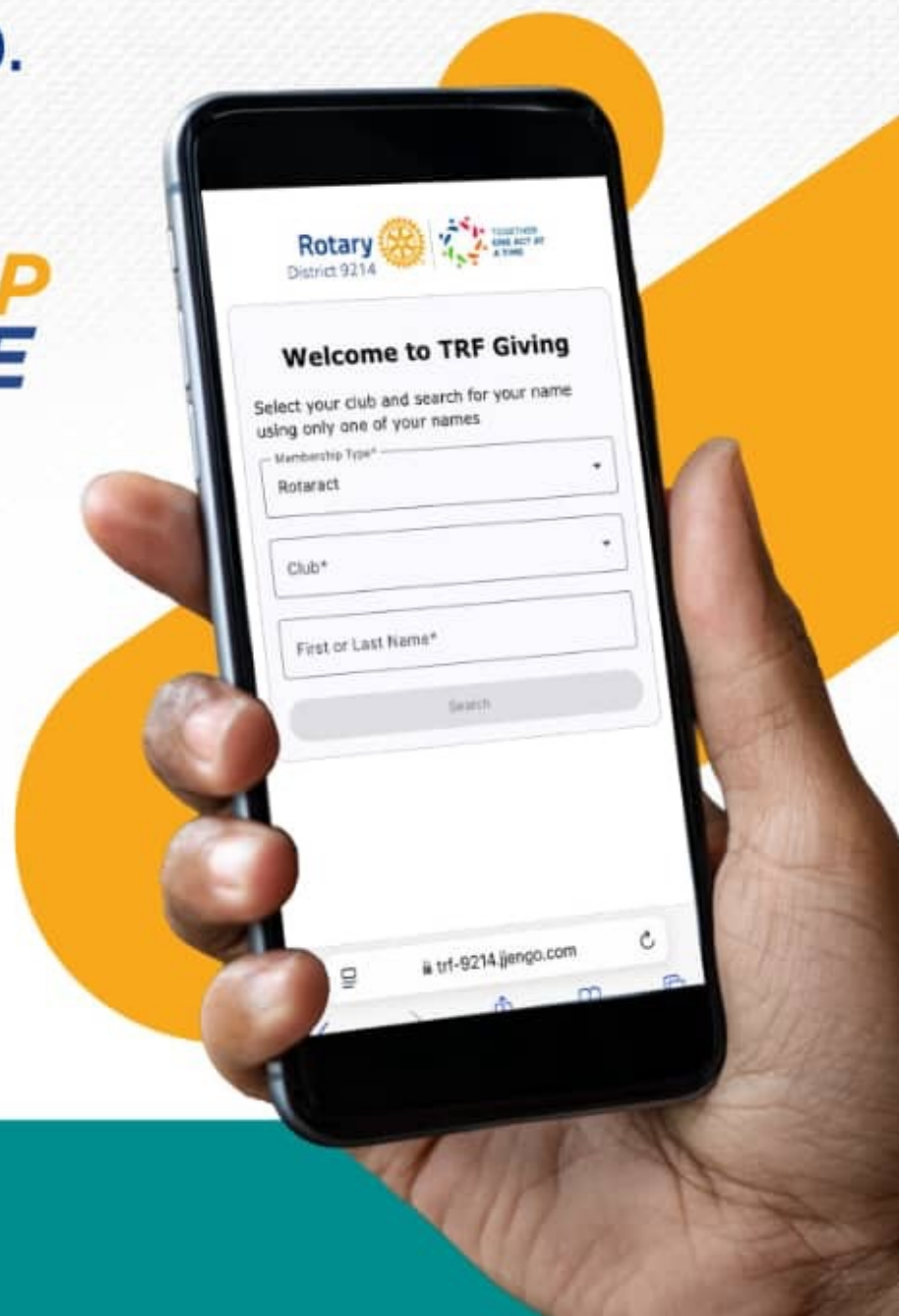

# Water Connects Us All

From a river in a remote forest to a stream running past a city neighborhood, freshwater ecosystems sustain humanity. Yet these waters are increasingly under strain. Pollution, overuse, and climate pressures remind us that protecting freshwater is a global challenge.

Rotary has always believed change begins within communities. Now we are working to see how far the impact of community action can travel. When local service is connected, measured, and shared, it becomes a force that extends beyond geography and borders.

A water project led by the Rotary Club of Panamá Nordeste exemplifies this idea. The project served Indigenous communities in Panama's Darién province, a region accessible only by canoe and small boat. With no roads, limited electricity, and reliance on untreated river water, families faced serious health risks.

To reach these communities, Rotarians had to rethink how supplies and services could be delivered. Working with a partner club in the United States and a specialized water organization, they introduced solar-powered water treatment systems for an area without access to an electrical grid. Local leaders were trained to operate and maintain the system, ensuring that clean water would continue flowing long after installation crews departed.

The results were immediate. Children who once missed school due to illness returned to classrooms. No longer needing to haul water from rivers, adults gained time and strength to work and support their families. What

began as a water project became a foundation for healthier, more resilient communities.

This is how we extend our reach: combine local leadership with global partnerships, technical expertise, and long-term thinking.

That same spirit is at the heart of Rotary's partnership with the United Nations Environment Programme through the Community Action for Fresh Water initiative. Around the world, Rotary and Rotaract clubs are restoring waterways, protecting wetlands, and safeguarding vital freshwater sources. By collecting data to map and measure this work, we can better understand its impact and show how local service contributes to worldwide solutions.

Data is not an end. It is a tool that helps us learn and improve so that Rotary's service delivers real, measurable change. Each project entered and each waterway restored adds to a shared story of stewardship and responsibility. As we observe Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene Month, I encourage you to reflect on the freshwater systems that sustain your community and the role Rotary can play in protecting them.

When we connect local action to a global vision, we strengthen Rotary's ability to make lasting change. Together, by extending our reach and working side by side, we truly Unite for Good.

# One Million Strong and Still Running

Last month, Rotary District 9214 marked a historic milestone: USD 1,000,000 contributed to The Rotary Foundation.

This is more than a financial figure. It is a statement of belief. A statement of discipline. A statement of collective responsibility.

Reaching one million dollars did not happen by accident. It happened by design.

First, it was the power of asking. We asked boldly. We asked consistently. We asked without fear of rejection. The worst answer we can receive is no. But every no leaves room for the next conversation. Every conversation creates awareness. Every awareness moment builds ownership. As leaders, we understood that fundraising is not about pressure. It is about invitation. And we kept inviting.

Second, the District Governor's Special Pin created accessibility in giving. By encouraging each member to contribute at least USD 100 toward The Rotary Foundation to receive the District Governor's Special Pin, we made participation tangible. Many members who had never given before stepped forward because the pathway felt achievable. The USD 100 entry point was simple, clear, and inclusive. It reinforced an important truth: every contribution matters. The culture shifted from watching to participating.

Third, the promotion of Named Funds unlocked significant capacity. Named Funds allow members to give toward areas they are deeply passionate about. individual contributions came in of USD 25,000.

Fourth, we had an individual gift to the Arch Klumph Society of USD 275,000 and another leader stepping up to the Arch Klumph Society circle/

Level 2. When members see that their giving can reflect their personal convictions, generosity increases. Structured giving builds confidence.

Finally, we operated under a shared rhythm: doing it together, one act at a time. Foundation giving was not treated as a side conversation. It was embedded in our fellowships, in our district

engagements, and even during the visit of Rotary International President Francesco Arezzo to Uganda. We spoke about it openly. We celebrated it publicly. We normalized generosity.

I want to sincerely thank our Governors, Assistant Governors, Club Presidents, Foundation Chairs, and every Rotarian who believed that District 9214 could lead from the front.

But we must remember: the Rotary year does not close at one million dollars. We still have three months to go before 30 June 2026. Momentum must not slow. It must accelerate.

As we observe Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene Month, let us reflect on why The Rotary Foundation matters

# Splash Into Better Health: The Power of WASH

**D**id you know that only 61% of Ugandans have access to improved water sources? That leaves us with the question on how the remaining 39% maneuver challenges that present with dirty water sources on a daily. This answers the reason we as Rotary Club of Nalumunye responded to our community call on improving a community well that serves more than 1000 dwellers.

The urgency of access to clean water sources is more dire now in our communities than ever before to combat the increase in spread of disease as the populations grow bigger on a daily. As we handed over the well, the community chairperson Milly noted that Nalumunye area will not be the same again with this kind gesture from the Rotarians. "The people who access this well will be free from disease, will have more time to attend to other economic activities since access to water is

now closer, less time will be spent in search of clean water". Hearing this from the chairperson brought a smile of satisfaction.

This act reminded me that in their CSR initiatives, World Bank notes that "Access to clean water and sanitation must [be] the goal of

every responsible leader in an effort to leave no one behind. "Are you that leader?"

Beyond March being a month where in Rotary we focus on the theme of WASH, it also humbles us as the Women's month Internationally.

Connecting Women to WASH, in 2018 the White Ribbon Alliance (WRA) conducted its major "WHAT WOMEN WANT" campaign across 114 countries. WASH was identified as top priority for maternal and health care. Women want safe, dignified care – and that includes having health facilities with running water, private toilets, and clean beds and sheets.

You and I then have a greater call to action in influencing provision of clean water sources, inviting partners on board that can support us change the livelihood in our communities, hospitals, schools and home where charity begins.

If we as communities, Rotary Clubs and organisations Unite for Good, we will improve Sanitation and Hygiene through WASH.

# Saving Lives, One Drop at A Time: A Successful Blood Donation Drive

In a powerful display of unity and compassion, the Rotary Club of Nalumunye in conjunction with the Mengo Hospital Rotary Blood Bank, partnered with secondary schools in Kampala Metropolitan area for a successful blood donation grand drive. The drive was run between 13th and 17th March 2026 at the premises of the respective partnering schools.

The initiative that specifically targeted secondary school students received an overwhelmingly positive response. A total of eight schools that donated varying numbers of blood units depending on the population of qualifying donors.

The remarkable number of blood units collected from the various schools is a reflection of the generosity, awareness, and willingness of young people to contribute to saving lives. This effort highlighted the critical importance of voluntary blood donation in supporting hospitals and emergency care services. The event was marked by enthusiasm, teamwork, and a shared sense of purpose. Students actively

participated, fully aware that their contribution could make a life-saving difference for patients in need of blood transfusions.



The daily demand for blood in Uganda is estimated to range between 1,200 and 2,000 units of blood and roughly 340,000 to 450,000 units annually, as reported by the Uganda blood transfusion Service. This demand is driven by the high cases of malaria, childbirth complications as well as road accidents. Unfortunately, the daily collection usually ranges between 1,000 and 1,250 units which creates a critical deficit which is responsible for approximately 30 mothers and children daily, and several accident victims.

This momentous blood donation drive by the Rotary Club of Nalumunye, inspired by the District Governor through the Action President (also President of Presidents for District 9214) Rtn Deborah Kyomugisha Kakande, will go more than a mile to reduce on the annual deficit currently registered in the accessible blood. It is a practical signal of Rotary's unwavering commitment to reducing maternal and infant deaths, cognizant of the fact that the main users of blood transfusion are: children (50%), mothers (25%) and other surgical patients, cancer patients and road accident victims (25%).



The Rotary Club of Nalumunye extends heartfelt appreciation to Mengo Hospital Rotary Blood Bank, the partner Schools' Management and Administrators, and all the students who participated in this noble cause. The collective effort is of meaningful impact to the community in saving lives.

Together, we continue to give hope and save lives—one donation at a time.

# Men As Allies in Raising Girls and Women

The room was filled with thoughtful silence as a powerful statement echoed through the fellowship hall: “Men have the power to define the destiny of girls and women.”



It was a message that lingered long after the words were spoken.

At the TAKE-OVER fellowship hosted by the Rotary Club of Muyenga and taken over by the Rotary Club of Nalumunye on Wednesday, March 10, 2026 Rotarians gathered not just for their usual meeting of fellowship and service, but for a deeper conversation about the role men play in shaping the lives of girls and women.

The evening’s presenter, Rtn Diana Ninsiima Kibuuka, a lawyer and mother to boys, delivered a candid and thought-provoking reflection on what it truly means for men to stand as allies in raising confident, empowered girls.

Speaking with conviction, she reminded the audience that the influence of men in a girl’s life – especially that of a father, is not merely important, but necessary.

“When you’re dealing with women, you’re holding a lot of power

over them,” she told the attentive audience. “Whatever you say or do to them, how you treat them, has a great impact on their identity, productivity, and sense of direction.”

Her words were both a challenge and a call to action.

In many societies today, women continue to face barriers and injustices – whether in workplaces, homes, boardrooms, or within the broader structures of society. Yet, as Rtn Diana explained, the journey toward equality and empowerment cannot be walked by women alone.

Men must be part of the change.

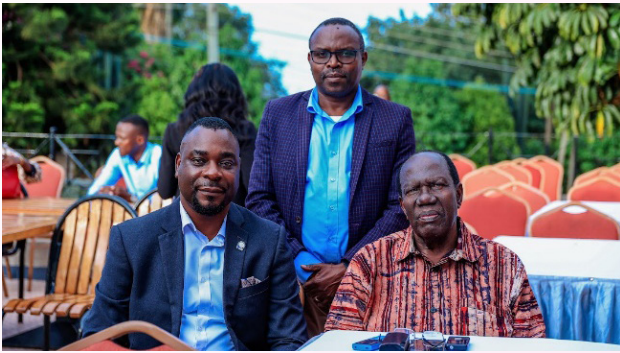
“The men here should understand that they have the power to shape the identity and destiny of the girls and women in their lives,” she said. “These girls and women look up to you for reassurance, encouragement, counsel, care, support, comfort, and sometimes simply the words, *‘How can I help you?’*”

*Among the distinguished guests were respected figures including former Makerere University Vice Chancellor Professor Edward Ddumba, Deputy Governor Augustus Nuwagaba, Ambassador Prof. Semakula Kiwanuka, Former Buganda Katikkiro JB Walusimbi, Rtn Andrew Kameraho, and several other prominent Rotarians whose leadership continues to shape Uganda's social and professional landscape.*





Their presence underscored the significance of the conversation taking place that evening.

The fellowship also highlighted the legacy of the Rotary Club of Muyenga, one of the oldest and most influential Rotary clubs in Kampala. With a membership of more than 150 accomplished individuals – many of them seasoned leaders and senior citizens, the club has long been a pillar of service and mentorship within the Rotary family. It is also the home club of **Rotary International Director Governor Elect, Emmanuel Katongole**.

But beyond titles and achievements, the evening's message was simple and profound.

The destiny of girls and women is shaped not only by policies, opportunities, and education but also by the **environment**, daily words, actions, and attitudes of the men around them.

- A father's encouragement
- A mentor's guidance
- A colleague's respect
- A leader's fairness

Each of these moments carries the power to either uplift or diminish a woman's sense of worth and possibility.

As the fellowship concluded, one sentiment resonated across the room: creating a just and equitable society requires collective effort.

Men and women alike must work together to build a world where every girl grows up confident, valued, and empowered to pursue her dreams.

Because when men choose to stand as allies, the future for girls and women becomes brighter – not just for them, but for humanity as a whole.

# RTN Angel: The Heartbeat of Joy, Service, and Bold Authenticity

In every Rotary club, there are members who serve and then there are those who ignite. **Malaika** as I call her, belongs unmistakably to the latter.

This journey is made possible by joining the Rotary Action Groups, commonly known as RAGs, and professional Fellowships for Rotarians.

When I learned about the opportunity to join a Rotary Action Group, I felt a bit overwhelmed by the choices because each Action Group in Rotary connects with my profession and my passion as a Social Worker and a Gender & Development Youth advocate.

Some of the RAGs I have explored as I delved include:

Environmental Sustainability Rotary Action Group (ESRAG) which focuses on promoting environmental sustainability and addressing climate change. The Action I took was only to subscribe to receiving its monthly newsletter updates which I receive up to date.

- ▶ Rotary Action Group for Community Economic Development (RAGCED) which works on economic empowerment projects including agricultural development, vocational training and infrastructure development.
- ▶ Water, Sanitation and Hygiene Rotary Action Group (WASH RAG).

Most recently, I discovered another very critical RAG on Menstrual Health Hygiene while taking one of the e-learning courses on My Rotary which I am yet to explore joining.

I joined International Fellowship for Rotarian Photographers (IFRP) after quickly perusing the many Rotary Action Groups. The fact that this group's membership is free and available to anyone who wants to join makes it even simpler to join. Additionally, I was curious about how Rotarians from all backgrounds and occupations may utilize photography to convey their experiences within and outside Rotary.

In a nutshell, this is how I met Rtn Jim Ludwick, the Treasurer of the International Fellowship

for Rotarian Photographers, and a Past President of the Rotary E-Club of District 910 living in Las Vegas, USA. He contacted me after seeing my location details and told me about his planned trip to Uganda to visit projects his club and other partners are currently supporting in partnership with RC Nansana Metro. He has worked for Rotary for forty years, and part of his influence has been in raising money for the END POLIO campaign throughout Rome and the USA.

As an avid photographer, he shares his passion for photography as something that inspires him to contribute more to community service, and a hobby that makes him *“enjoy capturing moments that reveal the soul of people and places through photography”*. I had the privilege of escorting Rtn Jim along with a team from RC Nansana Metro to some of the historical places such as the Kabaka’s palace in Mengo and the Semagulu museum - places which I think truly captivated him.

In conclusion, meeting Rtn Jim through the International Fellowship for Rotarian Photographers is a testimony to the Fourth Goal of Rotary: “to advance international understanding, goodwill, and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional persons united in the ideal of service”. Such experiences are what should keep inspiring Rotarians to stick with Rotary by giving it their all.

# Water, Sanitation & Hygiene Month

**R**otary Club of Nalumunye Heights was Chartered on 3rd October 2025, sponsored by the Rotary Club of Nalumunye.

We are delighted to celebrate the month of March as Water, Sanitation, and Hygiene (WASH) Month, a time when Rotary clubs across the world dedicate their efforts towards promoting access to clean and safe water, proper sanitation, and improved hygiene practices.

In line with this important focus, the Rotary Club of Nalumunye Heights partnered with the National Water and Sewerage Corporation (NWSC) to host an engaging community dialogue centered on sustainable water use and management.

The club was honored to host key representatives from

NWSC, including the Branch Manager Kyengera, Mr. Douglas Kukundawe, the Nalumunye Branch represented by Milly, and the Chief Analyst from the Head Office, Mr. Osbert Atwine. Their presence provided the community with firsthand technical insights and practical solutions to ongoing water challenges.

The session sensitized the community on critical issues including maintaining clean water tanks, practical water-saving methods at home, understanding and managing water bills, and ensuring the safety of household water. Residents were also guided on the importance of closing taps during supply interruptions, using quality plumbing materials to prevent wastage, and granting access to authorized NWSC staff for

accurate meter readings to avoid estimated billing.

In addressing local concerns, NWSC acknowledged that Nalumunye estate has been experiencing unreliable water supply, largely due to the breakdown of the Bandwe pump. However, they reassured residents that a new and more powerful pump has been procured and will be installed soon

to stabilize supply. Additionally, NWSC has secured land around Kidomoole Area for the installation of a booster station, which will further enhance water pressure and distribution across the area.

Residents were encouraged to report leakages, pipe bursts, and illegal water connections, as these not only lead to water loss but may also cause contamination. The use of borehole water was discouraged, as underground water in many areas may contain harmful physical impurities despite appearing clear and therefore may not be safe for human consumption.

NWSC further committed that within the coming months, Nalumunye will experience a more reliable water supply, reinforcing the shared vision of "WATER FOR ALL."

To enhance understanding of water costs, residents were informed that a domestic customer is charged approximately UGX 4,319 per cubic meter, which translates to almost 45 jerricans

of water, making the cost per jerrican approximately UGX 102, a strong reminder of the value and affordability of treated water when used responsibly.

The club was equally delighted to witness a significant milestone as the President Elect, Mrs. Scovia Biira Bwambale, officially unveiled her Board. This moment symbolized readiness and commitment, as each member of the incoming leadership team stepped forward to affirm their roles and dedication to serving the club and community.

The event was graced by Past District Governor Peace Taremwa, who emphasized the importance of teamwork, unity, and commitment among incoming leaders as they prepare to take on their responsibilities.

Additionally, the President Elect, Mrs. Scovia Biira Bwambale, Treasurer Ann Kadobera who was represented by Assistant Treasurer Rtn Eleanor Sabuka, and Club Secretary Counsel Doryn Sabuka actively participated in

the Presidents-Elect Learning Seminar (PELS). During this training, the district leadership team, led by District Governor Elect Daniel Damulira, outlined key expectations and goals for the upcoming Rotary year. The participants were also equipped with practical knowledge of their roles and engaged in meaningful group discussions to strengthen their leadership capacity.

As a club, we remain committed to advancing Rotary's mission by creating sustainable impact in our communities—starting with access to clean water, improved sanitation, and hygiene for all.

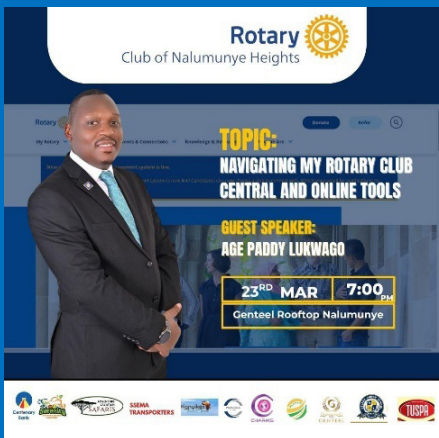
